Wound Care Instructions

- 1. If you have sutures, apply ice to the surgery site for 20-minute intervals on the day of surgery.
- 2. Clean the wound with soap and water or hydrogen peroxide twice a day.
- 3. Apply Polysporin or Bacitracin antibiotic ointment (Neosporin if not allergic) to the wound after cleaning it.
- 4. Protect scabs or stitches with a Band-Aid or a dressing
- 5. Discomfort and swelling are usual between 6-20 hours after surgery. If they are annoying, take Acetaminophen (Tylenol) or a similar <u>Non-Aspirin</u> painkiller (i.e., <u>no</u> Advil, Motrin, Ibuprofen or Aleve). If pain continues, or severe discomfort or swelling occurs, call our office promptly.
- 6. Wounds may bleed. If so, cover the wound with a clean tissue or cloth, and apply direct pressure for 10 minutes by the clock.
- 7. If the skin around the wound becomes red, swollen and painful, it may be infected. Call us promptly at the office.
- 8. You may shower, but do not soak your wound in water.

For your information...

Your biopsy specimen will be sent to another physician at a dermatopathology laboratory for interpretation. Please note that your insurance company will be billed <u>both</u> for processing of your specimen by the lab and for interpretation of your specimen by the dermatopathologist/physician, who in turn reports these results to me.
